
The Rotary Club of Hornsby District Annual Report 2018 – 2019



Presidents Report

While I have never been one to look forward to writing reports, this is a report that brings with it a sense of completion and satisfaction. I would be dishonest if I said I was initially looking forward to the year as President but as the year progressed, I did enjoy the role and developed a great sense of pride in the club. We are still a small club, but we do 'punch above our weight' in many respects. The fellowship between the members has continued to grow to where I believe that we are truly one club.

The year did not progress as I had planned (but when does it ever?). The cancellation of the plans for the Ginger Meggs Festival was a disappointment at the time, but I have always prided myself in listening to others when in a leadership role, I was persuaded that the plans as I had them, carried way too much risk for the potential reward. To replace it we brought back the Trivia Night, this was again a success with just over \$3,000 going into our charity account. The two Election BBQ's were a surprise in that the one with the most voters returned about half the profit.

The Coin Program under the stewardship of a great and hardworking committee, led by Geoff, continues to provide excellent results and after a poorer than expected 2017-2018 result this year was back to the excellent levels of previous years.

Through the Coin Program we are developing an excellent relationship with Carnival Lines, they have given us furniture which has all now been either sold or distributed to other clubs projects and most recently a significant amount of clothing that we were also able to distribute to projects.

What all that added up to was total disbursements for the year of \$24,000 – that is \$1,000 per member. You have set yourselves a high bar to jump over next year!

On top of that we assisted Cancer Council in fundraising on Daffodil Day and Lifeline with the Book Sale at Hornsby Girls High and \$500 to Studio ATRTES by running the BBQ for their Ride A Day in My Wheels day and we were able to donate surplus stock from the BBQ's to the Women's Shelter.

Then there is also the Senior Citizens Lunch, another great and long time project.



Along with a trip to the movies the highlight for the girls was a visit to a local Thai restaurant where the cuisine was something they had never experience before. It was a first time they had experienced the many cultures Sydney offered them.

For those that do not know Tottenham it is 500 KM west of Sydney. Tottenham is the closest town to the geographical centre of NSW and is part of the Lachlan Shire Council. Drought is again on the agenda, so things aren't easy out there. The population of the town is 330 and it services and sustains an overall regional population of 1000. The region specialised in the product of wheat, prime lamb, wool, beef, sport, lifestyle and hospitality.

COIN COMMITTEE REPORT June 2019

The foreign exchange coin project has continued successfully this year. After the loss of AMEX sites and Travel Money Oz locations, Bendigo Bank now provides our main collection points, along with several NAB and CBA branches and some branches of Helloworld Travel.

A major breakthrough came this year with our partnering with Carnival Cruise Lines. Following their donations of furniture and clothing, which have been dispersed to local and international charities, this partnership will hopefully extend to donations of foreign currency in the future.

Once again, participating Rotary Clubs around Australia have helped us achieve a good result and we thank them for their dedication to this project. Victoria – Barbara and John Rafter, RC of East Keilor, assisted by RC Glenferrie and RC Bendigo Strathdale. South Australia – Kevin Hales, RC of Goolwa. Western Australia – Ian Bradshaw, RC of Wanneroo, Roman Mandyczewsky, former RC East Perth. Other NSW/ACT participants are Janet Grundy, RC Wahroonga, John Steele, RC of St Ives, Greg Raisin and Helen Bennett, RC Woden Daybreak. All these clubs will receive cheques, based on the weight of coins they have collected, for their nominated projects.

Last June and again in March 2019, a total of 600kg of currency was sent to Global Money Exchange, comprising coins and notes which are difficult to repatriate through normal channels. This resulted in receipt of \$24,000.

Total collections in the 2018/19 year have exceeded 400kg, with total income from sales and repatriation around \$42,000.

Sale of rare coins, tokens and pre-decimal Australian currency continues on ebay.

Thanks to our team of collectors, sorters, travellers, book keepers and other helpers for their hard work and support with this project – in particular Stephen and Anita Bruce, Bobby and Maddie Holder, Bill Scott, Kylie Williams, Greg and Jennifer Timewell, Rob Caldwell, Heather Hogan, David Webster, Stephen Farr, plus the many others who have carried coin overseas and assisted in other ways.
